FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

WHEN UNCERTAINTY CALLS FOR A GROWTH MINDSET

I've been thinking a lot about navigating uncertainty. Every day, my inbox fills with messages about how cuts to once-reliable funding will affect families in our communities. Some changes are already unfolding; others are anticipated. As an organization supporting low-income, working families, we feel these concerns deeply. These are our neighbors — some of whom you might not even realize are struggling to make ends meet. And yet, the truth is, we don't really know what is going to happen. We are caught in a season of uncertainty, and we've been here before. Yet we carry on, certain in our purpose.

During the pandemic, no one imagined that two weeks of sheltering at home would stretch into months; that we'd be socially isolated; that incomes would vanish; or that so many families would stand on the brink of losing their homes. It was overwhelming, but we adapted — because humans are resilient, and so is FamilyForward. We respond to immediate needs, and we also plan proactively for what might lie ahead.

Embracing a growth mindset

In times like these, a growth mindset becomes more than an idea — it's a way forward. It's the belief that our capacity to meet challenges grows when we combine effort, strategy and support from others. At FamilyForward, we meet families who are living in survival mode, facing hard realities and limited choices. Through financial assistance, we give them room to breathe. Through mentorship, we help them expand their capacity to change, to grow and to create a future that looks different from today.

MAKING AN IMPACT ON HOPE FOR HOMES DAY

FAMILY SUCCESS STORY SINGLE MOM GETS BACK ON TRACK

"Natalie" works in the billing department of a major insurance company, and she earns a decent wage. However, after her marriage ended, she struggled



financially. Her wage level was too high to qualify for state-sponsored health insurance, and paying to cover her two children with her employer's health insurance resulted in a significant decrease in take-home pay. Natalie's wage level also disqualified her from receiving SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, also known as food stamps) benefits, and the children's father only inconsistently paid child support. Meanwhile, her landlord continued to raise the rent each year. Despite her best efforts, the debt piled up and she felt trapped — always behind, never able to catch up.

When Natalie applied to FamilyForward, her growing debt meant her monthly expenses were inflated by penalty fees and interest charges. Once accepted into our two-year program, she and her children were no longer at risk of losing their housing. The FF rent subsidy gave her some financial breathing room each month. With guidance from her two volunteer mentors, she began to pay off high-interest debt, reduce credit card balances, and contribute to an emergency fund. FF's debt-reduction matching program helped her pay off some of her credit cards twice as fast. Natalie faced many challenges, yet continued to make steady progress. By the time she graduated from the FF program, her credit score was the highest it had been in years. And she felt encouraged and supported.

Sometimes earning a decent wage is not enough for a parent to make ends meet. Often, single parents fall into the gap, earning too much for state assistance but not enough to support their family. With FF's help, Natalie was able to get the temporary rental support she needed while she worked to decrease debt and learn important money-management skills. AFFORDABLE LIVING IS BEYOND REACH FOR MANY FAMILIES

In July, the National Low Income Housing Coalition released its annual *Out of Reach* report. This report, which examines the affordability of rental housing throughout the United States, found that in Cook County, Ill., rental-housing costs continue to be challenging for low-income families. The hourly wage required to afford a two-bedroom rental — without paying more than 30% of their income on housing — is \$33.87 in Cook County. This measure assumes that the rental is listed at fair market rate (FMR), which is \$1,761 per month, as established by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. In our experience, families are paying above the FMR or not earning enough to meet their housing costs.

As of August 2025, families enrolled in FamilyForward's two-year program earn an average hourly wage of \$23, and face housing costs as high as \$2,300 per month. One working adult in our program would need to work 1.5 full-time jobs simply to pay rent at the current FMR. Factoring in other costs, the hourly pay single parents need to sufficiently provide for their families only increases. For example, according to the Economic Policy Institute's Family Budget Calculator, a single parent with two children in Cook County would ideally earn \$45 per hour to attain a modest standard of living.
